

Dear Mr. Vegliante:

Pursuant to the provisions of Article 15, Section 3.D, I hereby initiate as a grievance at the Step 4 level the dispute concerning the Postal Service's proposal to employ salary off-sets to collect alleged salary overpayments.

As you are undoubtedly aware, the Postal Service recently made thousands of incorrect promotion pay anomaly lump payments as a result of an administrative error. We have been advised that the Postal Service proposes to correct certain of these errors by collecting alleged overpayments through a salary offset.

This action would violate numerous provisions of the National Agreement, including, but not limited to, Articles 5, 19 and 28 as well as the provisions of Subchapters 450 and 460 of the *Employee and Labor Relations Manual*.

This grievance should be discussed at the earliest possible opportunity.

Subject: Promotion Pay Anomaly

Dear Vince:

As you will recall, I notified you on December 17, 1999, that the pay period 26 quarterly anomaly payment would be postponed until no later than pay period 06-2000. I have now been informed by Finance that the payment was processed in pay period 02; however, not without further problems. Apparently, as a result of loading the wrong file, the system processed payments based on anomalies experienced in pay periods 12 through 19 instead of pay periods 20 through 24; thus, resulting in both under and over payments.

According to Finance, steps are being taken to reprocess all payments within the correct time frame, and blend the results in with the next scheduled quarterly anomaly payment in pay period 06. Thus, employees who were underpaid will receive adjustments, and employees who were overpaid will have their negative amounts offset by any positive amounts from what they would have received in their pay period 06 payment. However, for those employees who were paid in pay period 02, but were not affected by the anomaly in pay periods 20 through 24, we intend to recover the erroneous payments through the established debt collection procedures. Finance roughly estimates that there are 2,080 such erroneously paid employees.
